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Dear Parents/Guardians

This is, as I am sure you will appreciate, a letter which I did not expect to write, nor is it a situation that has ever crossed my mind as a potential hurdle for all of us to cross as part of the current Year 11 cohorts journey through Bishop Wordsworth's School. Nevertheless, the landscape is evolving day by day and, ultimately the two words which I used to introduce the new school year of 'challenge and resilience' seem more apt than any of us were to realise.

I would firstly like to offer my sincere thanks to both you and the boys for making my time as the lead for the year group so enjoyable and thought provoking. It has been a privilege to share in the journey that each of them has engaged in and I am indebted to them for the growth, both personally and professionally, that I have benefited from as part of the process.

While there was an inevitability to the last couple of days in terms of the national picture and a build up to school closures, I appreciate that this will not negate the disappointment that the boys will feel in having to sign off from a community which they have contributed to for the last five years – almost a third of a lifetime for some of them.
