### MENORCA EXCHANGE – MEETING – Wednesday 10 May

There will be a meeting for all students and parents about the exchange at **17:00** in the Sixth Form Common Room on Wednesday **10** May. The meeting will last about 30-45 minutes, until 18:00 at the latest. This will be an opportunity to meet the trip leaders and other parents, bring questions about the trip and talk about how to make the most of the exchange.

All the practical information for our trip (flights, phone numbers, pack list, etc.) is enclosed with this letter. We strongly recommend that you go through it carefully when preparing for our trip to Mahon. Shortly before the above meeting takes place, all the boys should have received the matching form or e-mail address of their exchange partners in Menorca and the initial contact should have taken place. The boys should stay in touch with to their partners through e-mail (or any other channel of their choice, e.g. Facebook, Facetime, Skype) to get to know them as thoroughly as possible before they travel to Menorca and practice their Spanish. We have tried our best to find a partner who shares hobbies or interests with your son. Don't worry if this is not the case: the only essential requirement is to be willing to make new friends and take part in new experiences!

There will be a lunchtime session before the trip in which I will give the boys some tips to deal with the language of exchange-specific everyday situations, including cultural aspects of which they need to be aware. They will be informed of the time and place in due time and it must be attended.

I look forward to welcoming you to the meeting; please do get in touch if there is any other information that you need in the meantime.

#### **TRAVEL DETAILS for Menorca 2017:**

### **DEPARTURE** (Monday 12<sup>th</sup> June 2017):

Meet at **Boat House coach park** (next to the Central car park in Salisbury) at **6.30 am**, in order to load luggage and leave on time. The coach (Solent) will leave at **6:45 am prompt**.

### **Easyjet: London Gatwick to Mahon**

Depart Monday 12<sup>th</sup> June 06:45am Arrive Monday 12<sup>th</sup> June 16:10pm Flight Number EZY 8303

We will be met at the airport by the Menorcan families and teachers and the boys will leave with them.

## RETURN (Monday 19th June 2017):

The boys will be dropped off by the families at school and a coach will then take them to Mahon airport.

### **Easyjet: Mahon to London Gatwick**

Depart 19 June 10:30am Arrive 19 June 11:55am Flight Number EZY 8302

The coach will pick us up and take us back to the **Boat House coach park**.

The approximate arrival time in Salisbury is 16:00pm.

Your son will phone you one hour before we arrive, please be there to collect him.

He will call you too if there is a delay.

### PROGRAMME for MENORCA 2017: 12<sup>th</sup> - 19<sup>th</sup> June

Our number-one priority is for our boys to *experience* everyday life with their exchange partners and their families first-hand. When not involved in excursions, lessons or activities organised by us, students are encouraged to join in in whatever is happening, even if is not something they would usually do.

Going to a football match, for a meal or a walk, cooking, playing table tennis, basketball or videogames, meeting their friends, tidying up the garden, watching the news or a soap opera, cinema (warning: no subtitles!)... If you are with them and you are using Spanish, you are doing it right! Show *interest* in what they do; everyone likes talking about what they love. They will be pleased and you will learn lots of things!

Your exchange partners will need some time to do their homework. You may have work to catchup with from BWS. Use this time to take care of that and to work on your Exchange Diary.

Please note that the programme below is simply meant to give an <u>idea</u> of the structure and type of activities that usually take place during the week. We review and update the programme shortly before the trip to ensure that everything runs smoothly, so both the order and content may change.

MONDAY 12<sup>th</sup> – Arrival and meeting the families

TUESDAY 13<sup>th</sup> – Lessons in the school

WEDNESDAY 14<sup>th</sup> – Excursion 1 (Fortress 'La Mola')

THURSDAY 15<sup>h</sup> – Lessons in the school

FRIDAY 16<sup>th</sup> – Excursion 2 (Hiking and afternoon exploring the coast)

SATURDAY 17<sup>th</sup> – Day with the families

Afternoon: brief meeting with all our students by the sea front

SUNDAY 18<sup>th</sup> – Day with the families

Some families may jointly organise a meal or get-together

MONDAY 19<sup>th</sup> – Departure

### PACKING CHECKLIST for Menorca 2017

### **DOCUMENTS**

- In a small waist purse, "bum bag" (army surplus stores sell them):
  - > PASSPORT (it must be up to date)
  - EHIC card (essential if you want to be reimbursed for medical treatment)

Your documents will be held in safe keeping by me during our stay in Spain. I recommend that you carry a photocopy in your bum bag.

> EUROS (in a wallet in the bum bag)

All trips, entry fees, activities and meals in Spain are included or provided by the family who is welcoming you. You will need Euros in Spain for drinks, snacks, presents for families (try to buy something nice – avoid causing your family a chocolate overdose!) and to buy your exchange partner an ice-cream! I suggest around 80-100€ and £30 pocket money.

### **FOOD**

- A few snacks to keep you going at odd moments (Spanish mealtimes are very different).
- NO food or drink is provided on flights, you need to bring lunch for the first day.
- You will need to buy something for dinner on the way back.

### **LUGGAGE**

- <u>Labels</u> on and inside all luggage please. Put your Spanish address as well as your home address. There is a <u>very strict</u> limit on luggage at check in: <u>20</u> kilos is the maximum weight you are allowed in your hold luggage; you will pay a hefty extra charge if you go over it! This does not include your hand luggage. Leave some <u>spare</u> kilos/room in case you bring something extra on the way back.
  - You can put heavy items in your hand luggage but they are also **very strict** with the size of the hand luggage: 56 cm long, 40 cm wide 25 cm deep. They will make you pay to check it in if it's any bigger than that, I know it by experience!
- Security measures apply at airports. <u>Do not pack</u> ANY liquids, gels or any sharp items (eg scissors) of any description in your hand luggage. Do bring a little <u>water</u> bottle but make sure you drink it <u>before</u> security. Liquids in your hand luggage will be confiscated and you will cause a <u>delay to the group</u>.

### CLOTHES, TOILETRIES and MEDICINES (continues overleaf)

- <u>Clothes</u> It should be <u>very</u> hot in June, so pack accordingly! However remember that you will be
  attending lessons and although students do not wear uniform, you should wear something
  appropriate (jeans, shorts, t-shirts are fine but flip-flops or tank tops are not!)
- Bring toiletries and \*\*SUN BLOCK\*\*, sunglasses. Medicine: e.g. asthma inhaler, paracetamol, travel sickness pills (in hand luggage, take in advance), any medicines that you know we will need.

ESSENTIAL: baseball CAP or sunhat for the walks, comfortable walking shoes. You will <u>not be allowed</u> in the walks if you do not have the proper gear! Bring swimming trunks as well, in case you need them.

### **OTHERS**

- A couple of pens and a little notebook for your school days and your Exchange Scrapbook project.
   After our return you will have about two weeks to finalize your mini scrapbook and hand it in to your teacher. You will learn how to do this in the Exchange Club training sessions.
- A present for your host family, to say thank you for being so kind to host you.
- Please do not bring expensive equipment (video cameras, videogame consoles, netbooks, etc.)
   because:
  - 1) you will be busy all the time
  - 2) the aim of the trip is for you to talk to people, interact and socialise
  - 3) it might get broken or stolen: the insurance company does not pay out in cases of negligence and theft involves hours in a police station getting a statement.
- You are welcome to bring your mobile <u>phone</u> if it is usable in Spain (might have to phone your provider re roaming), but look after it see above. <u>Camera?</u> Do bring one, but not a super expensive one, for the same reason.
- <u>Insurance</u>: please note that our school policy does not cover dangerous sports or unsupervised swimming. I have completed a special risk assessment for the cycle ride organised by the school.
- <u>Conditions of behaviour</u>: Boys, we are always very proud and impressed by our students' behaviour, and we would be very embarrassed to have to send anyone home. If there was serious misconduct, you would fly back home immediately, at your parents' expense. Needless to say that this has never yet been necessary. You all know how to be a good and polite guest. Remember that you are an ambassador for your family, school and country.

### Finally...

Remember that we are going to Spain to LEARN. As enjoyable as it will be, it is not a holiday. You will learn about Spanish life and culture in a way you would never be able to with a textbook. You will get to know and form real friendships with Spanish people, hopefully lasting ones. Be open-minded and you will get a huge amount out of it, and do not underestimate what you do before the trip: the more you get to know your host family IN ADVANCE, the better your experience will be.
